Headteacher's Message



With this academic year heading to its conclusion, I am already extremely excited about next year. Next year, Cardiff High School will become the first recognised secondary, 'Outstanding Teacher Hub School' in the Central South Consortium. This will enable us to provide top quality teacher training, not only to our own staff but to staff from other schools. This is a very exciting development.

I will be advising all staff in school to allow a little more time for travelling that day and will ensure that staff leave site as soon as possible at the end of the day to avoid possible road traffic congestion. 
Art News

Maths Department

Walking Talking Mock

It's 8:30am. In 30 minutes you will begin what is generally regarded as the most daunting GCSE examination, your Mathematics exam. The mere thought of Mathematics is enough to send many parents, never mind pupils, into a cold sweat; just ask Mrs Olsen. In which case, why did our Year 11 pupils appear so positive, troubled only by nervous excitement, ahead of their Non-Calculator Maths examination on 9 June?

We believe our pupils' positive mindset was down to their own excellent preparation, and in part down to a very special revision session held the preceding Saturday morning: the Walking Talking Mock.

The Walking Talking Mock is a new initiative developed in partnership between the Mathematics and English Departments and the Key Stage 4 Achievement Team. During the session pupils sit in the exam hall, in their exam seat, in exam conditions and work through an exam paper. The only difference between this and the real exam is that there are breaks, perhaps up to 15 of them in the Mathematics exam. During the breaks, pupils are taken though an exemplar solution of the question they have just tackled, marking and correcting their work as necessary. As a result, at the end of the examination, every pupil leaves their exam seat, in the exam hall, with a complete and 100% accurate exam paper. So, when the big day arrives, every one of our pupils knows what it's like to feel success in a Mathematics exam.

Does it work? In November, we conducted our first Walking Talking Mock ahead of the Foundation GCSE examination. The buzz created among the pupils following the mock was inspiring, and Higher Tier pupils, who had not taken part, were soon clamouring for their own similar session. Pupils' results? They were beyond our most optimistic expectations and we believe the Walking Talking Mock played some part in their success.

This summer we are working with our partner school, Lliswerry High, to

develop and run a Walking Talking Mock for their pupils ahead of the GCSE Mathematics examination. Through sharing our experiences we hope to make a small, but significant, difference in giving all our pupils a positive mindset going into the Mathematics exam.

Maths Success

This year has seen some outstanding mathematical achievements by our Key Stage 3 and Key Stage 4 students. Following the Intermediate Maths Challenge in February, five students from Years 9, 10 and 11 qualified for the next round of the competition; congratulations go to Rory Xiao, Alex Harrison, Emily Godbehere, and Eleri Williams. Eleri also qualified for the next round in the Senior Maths Challenge! Year 9 pupil, Yifei Chen, deserves a special mention having qualified for the International Mathematical Olympiad; his performance placed him in the top 7% of all students who participated in this round of the competition.

As if that wasn't enough, on 3rd April, Yifei Chen, James Martin, Kanghee Bae and Zaid Dudhniwala competed in a UMKT Team Maths Challenge regional final and beat 25 other schools to win a place in the National Final to be held in London at the Royal Horticultural Halls on Monday 23rd June. Given that over 1700 schools competed in the regional finals and 80 have qualified to take part in the National Final, this is an outstanding achievement by all four students. The competition combines mathematical, communication and teamwork skills and offers students another way to express and develop their enjoyment of mathematics. We wish our talented mathematicians much success in the National Final and look forward to more mathematically prosperous years ahead!

History Department

Centenary Battlefields Tour 2014

On Thursday 22nd May, 29 pupils departed for the battlefields of the Great War accompanied by Mr. Desambrois, Mrs. Toye and Mr. Olsen. After a short stop at Dover to collect our guide Peter Crook, the party arrived at the Ypres Lodge in Lo in the early hours of Friday morning and headed to bed for a good night rest before the first day of the tour.

Friday's tour of the Ypres Salient began on foot, visiting 3 nearby cemeteries, and finding out about the work of the Commonwealth War Graves Commission. It also allowed us to locate the first of many 'old boys', Guardsman H Gribble, buried in New Irish Farm Cemetery. From there it was off to the muddy preserved trenches of Sanctuary Wood Museum, where after a 'wellie selfie' the pupils explored the trench and tunnel system. A short coach ride brought us to the Memorial Museum at Passchendaele with its recreated bunker and trench system, before moving on to Tyne Cot Cemetery, where a short service was held at the Memorial Cross and a wreath lain in memory of the 4 'old boys' remembered there. The party then proceeded to Langemarck German cemetery where the pupils were asked to consider the very stark differences between how



the 2 sides commemorate their dead, before a short meal stop in central Ypres and reassembling at an incredibly crowded Menin Gate for the 'Last Post' ceremony. During this Amy Doyle and Rebecca Ellis-Hillman laid a wreath on behalf of the school, before the party searched through the 53,000 names to locate a number of fallen 'old boys' from the Welch



Regiment.

Saturday was supposed to be a day of relaxation with a trip to the local Bellewearde Theme park. However, a short stop at Essex Farm cemetery was squeezed in so that pupils could see the site where Canadian doctor John McCrae wrote the famous 'In Flanders Fields' poem, and see the much visited grave of Private Valentine Strudwick, at 15 one of the youngest British soldiers killed in Belgium. Once at the park both staff and pupils took advantage of the water rides to cool down in the sunshine, before spending the evening bowling.

Sunday was a long day, with an early start as the party headed south to visit sites on the Somme. On route there was time to stop at Fromelles to

see the Australian 'Cobbers' memorial, and at Neuve Chappelle for a brief photo stop at the impressive Indian Memorial. The first stop on the Somme was at Newfoundland Park which stood on part of the battlefield



from the 1st July 1916, and we heard the story of the massacre of both the South Wales Borderers and the Newfoundland regiments. From there it was on to Thiepval and the giant Memorial to the Missing, where we located Cpl. Harry Lloyd, great granddad of Mr. Sealey. The end of the day had a very Welsh emphasis with a short service held at the Welsh Division memorial at Mametz Wood, during which Molly Murphy laid a wreath at the foot of the Welsh Dragon. Peter Crook told us the story of the ill fated Cardiff City Battalion, before taking us to the Dantzig Alley Cemetery to explain to us the exploits of 'Mad Jack'- Siegfried Sassoon the famous War poet and officer in the Royal Welch Fusiliers, and his one man attack on Mametz Wood! On the way home there was time to squeeze in family visits for both Simon Evans and Will Godden.

Monday saw tiredness kick in and a very quiet journey home!

Commemorating D-Day

To commemorate D – Day we would like to share with you details of a past pupil of Cardiff High School for Boys, found whilst researching our archives and the history of our school. Lt. Derek Dutton landed on the beaches at Normandy on D – Day (6th June 1944) and was killed in action near Breville, Normandy on the same day.

Cardiff High School – D-Day Hero

Derek Alan Dutton, born 20th November 1919, attended Cardiff High School for Boys from

January 1930 – July 1933

Unit - 6 Commando - South Wales Borderers

Rank - Lieutenant

Date of Death – 17th June 1944 (official date of death 17th June, but reliable eyewitnesses claim he was killed in action on 6th June

1944, near Breville, Normandy. Age – 24 years

Gravesite – Pontypridd Crematorium, Glamorganshire Panel L.H.

Geography News

Geography World Cup!

The Geography department is fully embracing the 2014 World Cup with Years 8 and 9. To extend their understanding of the topics studied, Year 9 students undertook a "Development World Cup" activity. Students used different statistical indicators, such as life expectancy, GNI and adult literacy, to complete different stages in the competition in order to find out which country would win the tournament based just on development.

Year 8 have completed an independent study of Brazil and have furthered this with group work looking at the climate issues of World Cup venues.



Students have looked at how the climate impacts on different groups of people visiting the tournament and have constructed graphs to show data for each location. All students have thoroughly enjoyed their learning experience and now have a deeper understanding about Brazil and the countries participating in the tournament.

GCSE Geography Revision Sessions

Our Year 11 Geography students fully embraced the revision sessions put on by the department in the run up to the GCSE examination. All sessions, including the Saturday revision session, were attended by large numbers of students eager to extend their learning and improve their examination technique. We wish all our students well for the future and hope many return to us for AS Geography in September!

Economics & Business

This term, Economics and Business Students have been revising for their GCSEs and A levels using a new, innovative tool to ensure they are ready for the exams. The department has created over 50 videos which have been used to

- describe complex topics
- prepare students for lessons
- improve exam technique
- explain past papers

These videos have been accessed by students via the department Twitter account, @chseconbusiness. Students have commented on the value of the videos, which have been accessed over 2500 times by Cardiff High Students since November. This amounts to over 15 days' worth of viewing, allowing students to be fully supported during their revision at home. Sociology News

The large number of students currently studying Sociology at AS and A Level shows how the subject remains a very popular choice. A promising set of Year 13 January exam results followed on from very pleasing results last summer and has seen a large number of pupils opting to continue their study of Sociology at university.

Although Sociology is only studied at Key Stage 5, pupils lower down the school will have opportunities to explore some sociological issues during the flexible week through analysing the cultural, religious and ethnic changes to Welsh society based on census data.

Furthermore, the department maintains strong links with other schools and organisations, most notably the Runnymede Charity in London. The link with Runnymede has led to the publication of pupil work in "Migration Stories" as well as Cardiff High pupils presenting research findings to MPs in Parliament.

Law News

The Special Study Paper and Legal Fiction



A fter the excitement of Parliament and the Supreme Court earlier in the course, classes in Years 12 and 13 have been focussing on mastering the English legal system and an introduction to Criminal Law. The OCR's method of assessment in the A2 Criminal Law course is particularly interesting as it promotes a critical approach to studying.

Marginally greater weight is attached to the more conventional paper where students must complete one

of a choice of essays. These invariably ask students to evaluate some area of criminal law – murder and the defences of insanity and automatism featured this year. The Year 13 class have focussed on developing structured approaches to such questions. The remainder of the paper puts the student in the position of a legal advisor faced with various hypothetical scenarios such as an unlawful killing or a series of assaults. Much of this year has been devoted to organising responses which strike a balance between Parliamentary law, case law and the likely argument that prosecuting and defence lawyers might raise in such cases.

Readers may be more interested in the second assessment. For a considerable number of years the OCR Criminal Law course has required that students sit their Special Study Paper. This seeks to mitigate the stress and intensity of a conventional exam and goes some way towards replicating the work of practising lawyers. Early in the academic year the board publish 'pre-release material' on a particular area of criminal law. The second exam is centred on these materials but rewards broader reading.

This year we received extracts from established legal texts and judgements from leading cases on robbery and burglary. In the case of R v Hale (1978) the Court of Appeal considered the requirement that force be used 'immediately before or at the time of' stealing for a defendant to be guilty of robbery. We then assessed the merits of the Court's idea of theft as a 'continuing act', as the defendant and his accomplice had tied up their victim and made threats regarding her son after getting their hands on her jewellery box. In the bizarre case of R v Collins (1973) the defendant climbed a ladder and entered a house dressed only in his socks. The Year 13 students then consider the particular nature of criminal trespass alongside matters tackled a year earlier – the reluctance of judges to reverse a decision of a jury in the Crown Court and the impact of decisions in the higher courts on society.

The close reading of legal materials and this taste of legal analysis and research have resulted in some sophisticated work. Several of this year's students have declared an interest in putting their studies to good effect at a higher level.



Science Department

Since our last newsletter, exam season has descended upon the school. Pupils in Y10, 11, 12 and 13 have been making the most of the vast number of revision classes and drop in surgeries available to them. Revision videos made by the department and published

on Twitter and Edmodo have also proved to be very popular. Sessions have been very well attended and we wish all of our pupils the very best for results day.

Y12 Museum Visit

Year 12 Biology students went to Cardiff National Museum this month. They spent some time with a team of scientists carrying out a biodiversity study. They were lucky enough to be given a rare tour of the many laboratories and collection

libraries hidden away in the basement. They also had a session with a team of research biologists and saw many unusual and interesting species of plant and animal found in Wales. They even saw a brand new species discovered by a Welsh entomologist- but we can't tell you about that as we have been sworn to secrecy!

Science in the Sun

The BTEC Biology group have been busy this term. They are taking advantage of the recent spell of nice weather to complete a survey of flora and fauna found in our school grounds. They have drawn a map of the area and are now recording the different plants and animals found in our school grounds. They have learnt how to use transcent lines, pooters, sweep nets and quadrats. Y10 have also been making the most of the sunshine, competing to work out exactly what speed the fastest sprinters were running at and comparing to Usain Bolt. They also calculated the velocity of a football over large distances.

Curriculum Changes

September will see big changes in the Science department. KS3 schemes of work have been totally re-written and the new material will be introduced to all three year groups at the start of next term. We aim to provide a stimulating and challenging skills based curriculum with an emphasis on practical work. Y10 will also see changes as we are moving to the WJEC exam board. Staff wise, Ms Addams will be leaving us in July to explore a new business venture. We have appointed Mr Nathan White to teach Chemistry from September and we are very excited to have him on board.



Matt and Rachel from ACTTraining College were kind enough to give the Year 10 Food Technology class a helping hand with making layered biscuits and came in to run a workshop with them. Year 10 really

enjoyed working with the chefs and picked up lots of tips during the session. The session covered some of the syllabus for the GCSE course and the knowledge learnt will be valuable during the year ahead.

The GCSE Food Technology groups visited The Chocolate Factory in Swansea. During the visit they were taught about chocolate, its origins

The PLC will meet once a term to discuss ideas and to see how we can maximise engagement and enjoyment in both lessons and through extra-curricular activities.

Lab in a Lorry

We are excited to welcome Lab in a Lorry in September. Lab in a Lorry is an interactive mobile science laboratory which gives pupils the opportunity to explore science through open ended experiments. Guided by scientists and engineers from industry and academia, the students relish the opportunity to work with 'real' scientists.

The Lab is fitted with three distinct lab areas where groups can take part in each of the

fun and informative experiments.



Flexible Week

We have been busy planning for this year's Flexible Week in which science will feature heavily. Y8 will be given the opportunity to explore the environment at Roath Park, collecting various samples to analyse back in the labs. Y10 will gain a fascinating insight into the world of Forensic Science. Pupils will have the opportunity to carry out the real techniques used by scientists to help solve crimes before being treated to a special guest lecture from Dr Carolyn Morton- Head of Forensic, Analytical and Chemical Sciences at the University of the West of England.

French **The Art of Communication**

A large number of our pupils in Year 10 have worked with our French assistant, Elisa, to establish an email and letter exchange with their peers in a French secondary school, 'Collège Jean Vilar' in Poitiers. He created a "people's theatre" and became a dominant force in the decentralization of theatre, believing that the theatre should be for all and not just for the elite.

We hope to continue this link and to use new technologies to enable them to speak to each other, thus enhancing their confidence to use French more spontaneously and meaningfully.

Year 9 will be given the opportunity to explore the important issue of stereotyping; exploring ideas based around the French culture and the Welsh culture. 

Psychology Update

Putting Theory Into Practice




In recent times the Psychology Department has been working with a student, Luke McGuire, who is completing his Masters Degree at the University of Cardiff.

The Psychology Department always jumps at any opportunity for A-Level learners considering career paths in the subject to get some hands-on research experience. Although the participants on this occasion were Year 8 and 9 pupils, a number of our AS Psychology students were enlisted to act as research assistants. This allowed them to gain skills in the application of ethical procedures through the consent and debrief techniques utilised as well as putting their numeracy skills to the test with some number crunching in the analysis of the data produced.

Luke McGuire's research was focused upon children's decision making and whether decisions to share (or not) are dependent on the rules of the friendship group. This is an interesting idea which could produce results that have important implications for the wider social and emotional themes that we address with students through their Wider Curriculum Dimensions studies.

We look forward to receiving a copy of Luke's final report and research findings and welcome other invitations from similar organisations for A-Level students to participate in or help administer such research projects in the future.



An Old Friend

The Psychology Department has recently made a new friend in somebody who is ultimately an old friend and student of the school.

Despite several of the textbooks he has written lining the shelves of our cupboards, it was not known that the acclaimed Dr. Nigel Holt had previously been a student of CHS.

Dr. Holt now works as a senior lecturer in Psychology at Aberystwyth University where he also holds the role of Director of International and External Relations in the Institute of Human Sciences. He has previously been a principle examiner at A Level and, as previously mentioned, has many publications for students studying to AS, A2 and undergraduate level, covering many fields of interest from across the subject.
