A message from the Headteacher

The last two years have seen unprecedented success for the school. In March 2013 Estyn acknowledged the excellent work that takes place in Cardiff High School, examination results have been outstanding, and we remain one of the best performing schools in Wales. The school has been recognised as a Lead Practitioner, one of only ten schools in the secondary sector in Wales to achieve this status. "The Western Mail" acknowledged us as an outstanding school in their own league table.

However, in keeping with my message over the last few years, schools can never stand still and we are now working harder than ever to improve what we do to enhance the learning opportunities for all our pupils. We are placing a huge focus once again this year on improving teaching and learning and developing outstanding

Mathematics

Cardiff High is awash with talented mathematicians. In September's prestigious UKMT Senior Maths Challenge, 27 pupils achieved at least a coveted Bronze award. The icing on this very mathematical cake however, was the achievements of Year 13's Joe Gage, Alex Taylor and Year 12's Ethan Ren, who all qualified for the Olympiad paper, and Year 11's Eleri Williams who qualified for the Kangaroo paper.

In November, a team of intrepid mathematicians also entered the highly competitive Senior Maths Team Challenge, achieving a commendable sixth

place. Congratulations to Year 13's Joe Gage and Ronan Smith, and Year 12's Ethan Ren and Merlyn Adams-Jenkins.

Maths challenges however, are not the only way in which pupils minds are being stretched with numbers and problem solving. Chess Club is up and running both inside and outside of lessons. Pupils should also look out for the other after-school and lunchtime maths activities that have got off to a flying start this year: Jaguar Cars Club (every Wednesday Lunchtime); Maths Surgery (Wednesday after-school); and Maths Drop-in (Mr Barnsley's room every Friday lunchtime).



You would have been forgiven for thinking Cliff Richard was back in the charts in October, as Year 11 pupils sat Cardiff High's inaugural 'Walking Talking Mock' examination. This was all part of 80 pupils' preparation for the November sitting of their GCSE Foundation paper. The pupils' ambition was infectious as they aimed to notch not just an early C grade, but more importantly, the opportunity to take a crack at the Higher Tier paper in the summer. A huge degree of thanks must go to: Mrs Olsen and Mr Moriarty for helping students prepare; Mr Cleall-Harding and the canteen staff for making the mock 'work'; and the after-school efforts of the maths teachers involved.

In September, we welcomed three new outstanding Mathematics teachers to Cardiff High: Miss Ayres, Miss Baker and Miss Woodhouse. They have all settled in well, and are enjoying working with Cardiff High pupils.

Imorance is No Defence

ince last writing, the Law Department has enjoyed several major events.

In September a team from our Year 13 class performed passionately in defence of squatters' rights at a moot in the University of South Wales. In November several A level students took up an invitation from Cardiff University to attend a talk by Lord Neuberger, President of the Supreme Court, at the Julian Hodge Lecture Theatre.



Our annual trip to London is never the same. This year's tour of the Palace of Westminster was led by a North American. We were given a new perspective on the unelected House of Lords, against the backdrop of political deadlock in our guide's homeland. Students then crossed Parliament Square to the Supreme Court. We were asked to consider recent cases including that of a Mr Gnango. He was found to be the accomplice in the murder of an innocent bystander, despite the fact that the fatal bullet was intended for Mr Gnango himself and fired by his enemy.

In October a large cross-section of the Sixth Form fired questions at Lord Touhig in the school library, as

part of a Parliamentary project aimed at engaging young people in politics. As an active peer and former member of a Labour Government, Lord Touhig was able to convince our students that power is not beyond reach. He spoke on a fantastic range of his work, from opposing state intrusion to a lifetime championing the cause of sufferers of autism and made a convincing case that casting a vote is a just minor part of the political process.



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Genetics on Tour

We were lucky to have the Wales Genetic Roadshow visit CHS this term. They introduced Year 12 and 13 Biology students to medical genetic research and its application in healthcare. The session was led by two key researchers from Cardiff University. Dr James Matthews presented his study "Using Gene Therapy to treat cancer". He informed us about the long process involved in developing new cancer treatments. He was followed by Dr Alex Murray who shared her study into inherited disorders and pre-implantation genetic disorders. This encompassed the scientific and ethical issues of the technique that enables couples with an inherited condition in their family to

For anyone with an appetite for medical sciences this was an ideal opportunity to gain a thorough insight into the world of research. 6th form students who wish to continue their interest in current health issues should attend the monthly Public Science Lectures held at Cardiff University. 
Tua'r Goleuni - Towards the Light - La Ville-Lumière

Wasteland to Useful Youth Facility

Ty Celyn Garden Project 2013 has become a major intiative which both staff and youth members have been working on for a few months. To explain what has happened we must travel back to the start.

<u>What we had</u>: a small paved area at the rear of the youth centre all covered in moss, broken wooden fence panels and a sloping overgrown bank which went down to the boundary metal fence alongside the wooded area.

What we did: With the help of a small grant from O2 we purchased



some hand tools and safety equipment and some compost. Youth volunteers and part-time youth staff started to cut into the overgrowth and to clear the bank of rubbish this became a major problem with youngsters up against the weather. We found that any work on the bank just got washed away with the rain.






We called in the experts, Kier Construction under the flag of Construction in the Community they advised us on how to secure the bank to make everything safe. We found that the job was enormous for a couple of volunteers so Kier said they would reinforce the bank backfill and fence the area to help the project. This left the young people with time to design a patch of ground ready to plant flowers and vegetables and for the staff to look at ways to integrate the garden project into the youth programme.

<u>November 26th</u> – Garden Project opened with live music and guests from Kier Construction, Cardiff Council Youth Service, Cardiff High School and Dreams & Wishes Charity plus sixth form volunteers making tea and coffee.




Interform Netball and Football



We are very excited about the fact that we have teamed up with our local community police in order to provide both parents and students with an opportunity to "Meet an Officer".



Fundraising for a 21st Century School

Why we need to fundraise

In 2010 the local authority changed the catchment area associated with Cardiff High School so that from 2011 a new form of entry would enter the school each year for the next five years. We expect to see the school grow from around 1450 pupils to eventually 1650 including Sixth Form increases - a significant change and a great strain on resources.

To meet this demand the local authority released funds to provide additional space in the school and in January 2013 a building project began. This was great news but with the strict financial constraints placed on everyone at the moment, while we will have more space, there is little to no budget to fill these areas with the equipment needed for excellent learning opportunities and 21st Century Schooling!

Fundraising is best secured by short term standing order commitments. This approach currently nets about £6000 a year for the school. This is even more lucrative when gift aided by tax payers and the school can reclaim the tax paid on these calculations to the tune of an extra 20p from the Inland Revenue for every £1.00 donated. Since June 2013 there has been a surge in standing order payments and happily this will secure around £8000 this year.

If you would like to help, please complete, the Standing Order form accompanying this leaflet. You can contribute as a one off payment, over ten months, or over the period in which your child attends Cardiff High School. Every contribution helps and we are very grateful for your support. 
