I recently read that for the sixth year running Wales has missed its recruitment target for teacher training. A worrying trend. After the last two academic years, I wonder what will become of the teaching profession? Encouragingly, there have been positive signs of a renewed interest in what schools do, not just operationally but in the classroom, as extra curricular activities and in the wider community. There is no doubt in my mind that becoming a teacher is a privilege. Hopefully, this curiosity will lead to more people entering the profession. The scrutiny in schools is in part, against the backdrop of the perceived loss of learning and emotional distress caused by the pandemic.

I understand this, and the school is planning short term and long term how we address these issues. But let's be positive for a moment, we should remember that during the last eighteen months, most of our children have engaged with learning, both in school and on line. We should remember that over the last eighteen months, most of our children have become more independent, more organised, better at planning out their learning and developed ways of working

that will be invaluable for them in their futures. We should also remember that many of our learners have enjoyed the experience of working from home.

Our philosophy in Cardiff High School has been one of learning together, the primary focus has always been to instil in our learners a love of learning. This will guide us as we approach our new academic year. Our approaches to teaching will ensure our pupils engage with their education, are confident to take risks, develop communication skills and leadership qualities, and benefit from socialising with one another. When you enjoy learning, that content which may have been missed, can be recaptured.

We look forward to a new academic year, hopefully without interruption, when we are able to bring back a little more routine to the working week, full of innovative and exciting learning opportunities and a wide variety of extra curricular opportunities. That is not to say that some of what we have learnt this year will not be utilised in our future approaches, for example from September, every pupil in our Sixth Form will be loaned their own chrome book. The idea of independent learning and different ways of learning will continue to be promoted. The structure of the school day is also significant, we want to give all year groups more freedom during their break and lunch periods. With more space comes greater opportunity to socialise and opportunities to make friends.

Along with our approach to instil in our pupils a love of learning, we have focused on numerous aspects of wellbeing for all our students. Looking forward, we are very confident the school will continue to evolve, that our pupils will engage in and enjoy their learning and we will provide an even greater level of care for our students.

It is has been a very difficult time for many of us and I am very grateful to everyone associated with the school for all their help, hard work and good wishes. Hopefully everyone will be able to enjoy the summer months and I look forward to seeing everyone again in September.

different ingredients and methods. Diolch to Erw for organising this online event. Hopefully face to face courses will restart in the coming months.





The Baxter Project

Therapeutic Activities Group CIC

Dave, Baxter and Trixie have been visiting CHS since December 2018. And more recently we have had Sam and Baxter for a visit on Fridays!

Dave O'Driscoll is owner, trauma recovery practitioner, youth worker and former probation officer. Pupils take Baxter or Trixie out for a walk, allowing Dave to work one to one with targeted pupils without the awkwardness of sitting face to face in a room. Children find it easier to talk whilst walking and Baxter breaks down barriers and opens up a dialogue.

Dave spends a whole day with us at CHS with Baxter in the mornings and Trix in the afternoons and on Friday's Sam and Baxter spend the day with us. Students go out individually for an hour walk and they are in charge of the lead! Dave provides a report on progress periodically, but targeted students can attend these sessions for as long as is necessary.

Allison Yarrow, Deputy Headteacher, said results from around 40 pupils referred for walks had been 'hugely impressive'.

The Baxter Project helps pupils with a history of low self esteem, has improved attendance for pupils suffering with school phobia, reduced fixed term exclusions and increased capacity in managing emotions and anger management.

As staff we love having Baxter and Trixie in school (and Dave), we love to make a fuss of them and it is definitely therapeutic for us!



Lost Property

The most useful piece of advice we can give you is to label everything! If an item of lost property arrives with us at reception and it has a name on it, we can happily reunite it with it's owner. Generally if an item is lost it will not arrive with us at reception until the following day, once the housekeeping team have completed their day and deposited all that they find with us. If the items have a name on them we will request the owner comes to reception to collect. Any items that are not labelled will be put in the lost property cupboard (**which fills extremely quickly**).

Pupils are permitted to ask for the cupboard key at reception to search for their lost items but unfortunately we can not allow parents to come into school and search due to Covid restrictions at the current time.

SIXTH FORM MUSIC QUIZ



Virtual Question and Answer session with the

Finance Minister and Chief Economist for Wales

The Business and Economics department were contacted by the Welsh Government to participate in a new engagement programme that is being targeted towards 16 -18 year olds, which was the first of its kind for the Welsh Treasury. With 16 -17 year olds now being able to vote for the first time in Wales, Welsh Government were keen to take this opportunity to engage with our Year 12 and 13 Economists on the role of the Finance Minister in Wales, and to bring them closer to the decisions which affect the Wales they live in, now and in the future.

At a time when obtaining work experience or taking part in visits was near impossible for our students, this experience enhanced current knowledge and understanding of Fiscal Policy and the wider macro economic factors that are influenced by Welsh Government decisions. The Minister and Chief Economist introduced themselves and explained their roles within Welsh Government, explaining the challenges they faced. Students were also able to ask questions during the live session.

This was a truly unique opportunity and our students thoroughly enjoyed the session!
