Y12 Gallery Visit to Bristol:





It is celebrated throughout Cymru and beyond – with special events held from Caerdydd to Patagonia! The hope is that a single "Shwmae" or "Su'mae" could inspire people to start their conversations in Welsh in future.

On dydd Gwener Hydref 14 we celebrated our own Dydd Shwmae in school with a variety of activities, competitions and prizes. During the day, pupils from years 7, 8 and 9 went dragon hunting to find out how many 'dreigiau cochion' were hiding around the school and counted the number of Shwmaes in Cymraeg (there were 37) and other languages (22!) Pupils also guessed the name of the bear with Eva Richards (7P), Alfie Lock (8R) and Poppy Sumner (9J) choosing the winning names.

Sara Abdalla (7R) won the prize for finding the most Shwmaes and Luke Perham (8P) created the best sentence. In the morning, forms completed quizzes and at lunch time pupils enjoyed pice ar y maen (Welsh cakes) whilst listening to the Candelas, Sage Todz, Yws Gwynedd and other Welsh artists.


the sessions and have been motivated to strive to reach their goals. Both will visit New College Oxford in the Spring and Summer terms.

Peer Mentoring

On the last few days of a very long Autumn half term, a group of Year 9 and Year 12s maintained their energy levels and enthusiasm during their Peer Mentoring training. The Peer Mentoring programme at Cardiff High is in its fifth year now. The purpose of Peer Mentoring is to support and enhance transition, peer relationships, attendance and attainment in pupils. Our Peer Mentors were selected for their high standards in work ethic, approachability and for being positive role models. Support is provided for KS3 and KS4 pupils on a one to one basis during form time. The Mentors enjoyed an intensive and interactive day of team building activities as well as opportunities to develop their listening and questioning skills, anti-bullying and safeguarding knowledge. They displayed fantastic levels of maturity and are excited to start working with their mentees this term. The Peer Mentors are matched with a younger student who may need support or guidance with school work, organisation, friendship issues, confidence or other stresses they have with growing up. 'Schools Love Reading' Scheme

This term, the English Department have been delighted to launch the 'Schools Love Reading' scheme to our students in years 7-11. This scheme, set up by the Welsh Government, provides all students in years 7-11 the opportunity to receive a book of their choice in exchange for a free voucher (of value up to £7). As a school, we have partnered with a local bookshop, Griffin Books, to provide students with the opportunity to order a book of their choice and have it delivered to school. We are looking forward to

hearing what our students have enjoyed reading as a result of this scheme.



Chess is booming at Cardiff High with several dozen players competing regularly at the weekly chess club held every Tuesday lunchtime in F4. Students of all ages are learning, playing and improving their chess in a fun and friendly environment.



Two of our strongest chess players at Cardiff High are Emma Kong in Year 7 and Khushi Bagga in Year 10. They have enjoyed much success recently as they have represented Wales in chess tournaments around the World. Emma is the U12 Welsh champion and has represented Wales at the 2022 Glorney Chess Tournament and at the FIDE World Chess U12 Championship in Georgia. Meanwhile, Khushi in Year 10 was selected to play for the women's senior team at the 44th Chess Olympiad in Chennai, India. Playing at this highly prestigious event is a very significant achievement and we are very proud of her.

Khushi wrote of her experience below;

"I was selected to play for the women's team for the 44th Chess Olympiad in Chennai which took place over the summer holidays. It was a massive gathering of players with nearly 2000 players and a similar number of volunteers. The whole city was decorated with pictures and statues of chess mascots due to this event. There was also a grand opening ceremony which was attended by famous Indian movie stars. I saw many great players in person and even played a few grandmasters for the first time in my life. We played 11 different teams from all over the world, and we ended up at 86th place out of 187 countries. To my surprise the lowly ranked Welsh team members were treated like celebrities and I thoroughly enjoyed the whole atmosphere. It felt like once in a lifetime experience."

Health and Wellbeing

Period Dignity

Learners in the current year 9 took part in an education workshop delivered by Brook focused on periods, body changes and reusable period products. The session deepened learners' knowledge of puberty and fertility, thinking critically about body image and self-esteem. Learners were also reminded about the range of period products available freely in school.



Jobs Club

Working with Careers Wales, we have been able to increase our offer of Jobs Clubs to learners, primarily



in key stages 4 and 5. This term, we have welcomed Adam Knop, TV/Film Producer on Dr Who, Lazarus Project, War of the Worlds and The Pact who spoke to learners about embarking on careers in TV and Film. Target Group spoke to students about careers in IT/Computer Science/Software Engineering. Willmott Dixon Construction talked about Degree Level Apprenticeships and higher-level professional roles in construction to do after a Degree. Martyn Prowel spoke about the different ways to access a career in law and the work of solicitors. Cyber Wales

provided a motivational talk about careers in cyber security. Cardiff and Vale UHB Clinical Psychology team spoke about careers in Clinical Psychology and Renishaw spoke about careers in Precision Engineering

These sessions have complemented the Health and Wellbeing sessions delivered to learners in year 9 and 11, where the focus has been on preparing our learners for transition to the next stage in their education, training and employment.

Football round up



The Y7 have made a fantastic start to the year, playing in friendlies against Whichurch, Bro Edern, Llanishen, and Eastern. Unfortunately, they were knocked out of the Welsh cup with a defeat to Radyr. However, the boys bounced back and produced a comfortable victory against Corpus Christi in the CVSFA cup. Lucas Howard-Machado has been an outstanding performer in the midfield, with Gabi Bird proving to be a real goal threat.

Visit to London



Thirty-two A level Law students headed to the Old Bailey as part of their trip to London on 25th November, accompanied by Mr Thomas, Mrs Jones and Mrs Tumelty. The day started with high tensions in the queue outside the court, as sentencing in a London gang murder trial was due to take place. We observed the proceedings of two murder trials, witnessing the painstaking work of the prosecuting barrister unraveling the facts of the case using mobile phone evidence and CCTV from the cases.

A short ride to Parliament Square and a visit to the Supreme Court followed. Whilst in the Court, pupils learned about the type of cases heard by the Supreme Court and Judicial

Committee of the Privy Council. The Court staff discussed the recent case of the Scottish National Parliament's attempt to hold another independence referendum, which a few days earlier, we had seen Lord Reid pass judgement on via a live video link. This really brought learning to life!

Next, we visited the Houses of Parliament for a guided tour. We sat in the public gallery in the House of Commons where we witnessed an Adjournment Debate by an MP for Darlington, who gave a posthumous recognition for Pilot Officer William McMullen, a very rare event! A very lively debate ensued in the Parliamentary Education Chamber on whether assisted death should be legal. Emma Solomons was speaker, Nia Templeton-Hall acted as Prime Minister advocating for the change in the law, Zaara Parveen represented the opposition and Gwen Morgan as the monarch.

The final vote was passed in favour of passing a new law and was given Royal Assent by Gwen.



Visit to Cardiff Metropolitan University

A number of learners took part in the LAW LAB event arranged by Cardiff Metropolitan University which was a great opportunity for learners to find out more about pursuing a degree or career in Law, Criminology and Policing. Learners also enjoyed the opportunity of courtroom experience, taking part in an eye witness testimony and playing the role of the judge bringing the law to life.



Learning about the Magistracy

Earlier in the year we welcomed Mohammed Jabbar into Law lessons, to talk to pupils about his work as a Justice of the Peace. This was a fantastic opportunity for pupils to ask questions about the types of cases heard in the Magistrates' Court, how decisions are made on sentencing and the skills needed to be a Magistrate.



Learning to Draft Legislation

In the summer term, we were visited by a former barrister at Lincoln's Inn who practised in family law and criminal defence, who then went on to work for the UK Government as an advisory lawyer and is currently working at the Welsh Government in their Legislative Office, drafting Acts of the Senedd. During the visit, students tried to draft legislation to ban the use of wild animals in circuses in Wales and realised how difficult and interesting a task drafting is. Pupils were keen to ask questions and find out more about Government law, an area of law that really appealed to some.





MUSIC London Tour 2022

There was great excitement towards the end of the summer term as the Cardiff High A Level music students set out for a visit to London. The main aim of our visit was to attend a late-night concert performance as part of the BBC PROMS festival at the Royal Albert Hall. We were sat a few feet from the concert platform of the famous hall and it was incredible to attend a top-class performance together.
